Safeguarding children and adults is everybody's business

Abuse can happen to anyone of any age, and it needs to be taken seriously. We encourage you to talk to someone, whether it is happening to you, or you witness it happening to someone else, or they tell you about it. It should never be ignored.

If you suspect abuse or if you are being abused, report it. Talk to your tutor, a member of staff, the police or call our Designated Safeguarding Officer Matthew Alvey on 07974 857 698 or the Deputy Safeguarding Officer Sharon Mullen on 07932 641 114.

Vulnerable adults

A vulnerable adult is a person aged 18 years and over who is or maybe in need of community care services by reason of mental or other disability, age or illness

and

Who is or maybe unable to take care of him or herself, or unable to protect him or herself against significant harm or exploitation.

PREVENT

Prevent is a government programme designed to identify and support all people of any age, race or culture who are at risk of becoming involved (radicalisation) with violent extremism.

The aims of the programme are to support people who live in Britain to respect each other and to live in harmony together.

Many people have different points of view about all aspects of life, and we should respect these differences even when we disagree with them. The difficulty comes when some people have extreme points of view, including far right, far left and extreme religious beliefs. We call this extremism. This can lead to violence and terrorism.

Radicalisation

The government defines radicalisation as a process by which an individual or group comes to adopt increasingly extreme political, social, or religious ideals and aspirations that reject or undermine the status quo or reject and/or undermine contemporary ideas and expressions of freedom of choice.

Extremism

The government has defined extremism as: "vocal or active opposition to British values, including democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty and mutual respect and tolerance of different faiths and beliefs". The college shares and promotes these values across our community.

British Values
