

Electoral registration form for a member of Her Majesty's Armed Forces, their spouse or civil partner

If you are a member of the Armed Forces, or the spouse or registered civil partner of a member of the Armed Forces, and you are a British, Irish or qualifying Commonwealth or EU citizen you can register either as a service voter or as an ordinary voter. The way you choose to register will depend on your personal circumstances.

- **You can register as a service voter using this form or by registering online at www.gov.uk/register-to-vote.** This allows you to be registered for five years at a fixed address in the UK even if you move around. You must renew your application every five years, but you can cancel it at any time. Registering as a service voter is particularly useful **if you are based overseas** or think you may be posted overseas in the next few years.
- **If you are based in the UK** and are unlikely to be posted overseas or change address in the next year, you can alternatively register to vote as an ordinary voter online by visiting www.gov.uk/register-to-vote or by completing a registration form which you can request by contacting your Electoral Registration Officer. You can find their address at www.aboutmyvote.co.uk

Your unit has a designated Unit Registration Officer who will be able to give you more information and advice. Ask your administration office for contact details.

How to register as a service voter

- 1 To register to vote in the UK, fill in the registration form overleaf.
 - You are resident at an address if that is your permanent home address. However, this does not mean you need to be physically present at that address all the time – if you are temporarily absent, for example, because you are posted abroad, you may still be resident at that address, provided the property remains your permanent home.
 - Whether you are resident at an address will depend on your individual circumstances. If you have any doubts about whether you are resident at an address, you should contact your local Electoral Registration Officer for advice.
- 2 Make sure you sign the declaration.
- 3 Send the completed form to the Electoral Registration Officer at your local council. You can find their address at www.aboutmyvote.co.uk

Register to vote as soon as you can, or it may be too late to vote in the next election.

Who is eligible to register to vote?

You can register to vote in the UK if you are:

- resident (usually live in the UK or would if you weren't a member of the Armed Forces or their spouse/civil partner), and
- aged 16 or over (although you won't be able to vote until you are 18).

You must also be either:

- a British, Irish or European Union citizen, or
- a Commonwealth citizen who has leave to remain in the UK or who does not require leave to remain in the UK.

When we receive your form

- ▶ If we need more information – for example, about another address or, if you are a Commonwealth citizen, about your immigration status – we will contact you.
- ▶ If you are eligible, we will send you confirmation that you are on the electoral register. If you are aged 16 or 17, we will let you know when you are on the register.

Other information

The open register

There are two registers. Why?

Using information received from the public, registration officers keep two registers – the electoral register and the open register (also known as the edited register).

The electoral register

The electoral register lists the names and addresses of everyone who is registered to vote in public elections. The register is used for electoral purposes, such as making sure only eligible people can vote. It is also used for other limited purposes specified in law, such as:

- detecting crime (e.g. fraud)
- calling people for jury service
- checking credit applications.

The open register

The open register is an extract of the electoral register, but is not used for elections. It can be bought by any person, company or organisation. For example, it is used by businesses and charities to confirm name and address details.

Your name and address will be included in the open register unless you ask for them to be removed. Removing your details from the open register does not affect your right to vote.

Your personal information

We will only use the information you give us for electoral purposes. We will look after personal information securely and we will follow the Data Protection Act 1998. We will not give personal information about you and the other people in your household to anyone else or another organisation unless we have to by law.
